He has a long association with Boys' and Girls' Brigade.


Married to Rutendo, they are blessed with two sons—Isheanesu & Anopaishe.

Moving countries was never going to an easy option, nor was it going to be simple to make all of the arrangements to receive this family. Add a glob-



al pandemic into the equation and the task becomes exceptionally complicated. Delayed Visa applications, travel restrictions, and quarantine regulations makes planning with certainty an impossibility. However, with faith, grace, patience, and a lot of goodwill and humour

we can, and will, enable the Nhariswa's to travel easily, arrive safely, find a home prepared, and place of welcome.

Noel has joined join us by 'zoom' at Circuit Leadership & Circuit Prayer Meetings. Texting, emailing, and whatsapp -ing has become a regular feature of our days. We managed to purchase a new manse just days before lock-down

in March. For sometime it has remained completely empty. The last few weeks has seen a flurry of activity. The whole house has been redecorated and some new carpets purchased. Teams of folk have helped prepare the new Manse at 120 Connolly Drive, Rothwell. I have had a few interesting video calls to Zimbabwe whilst trying to choose furniture, and generally we have made this fun.

If anyone has the skill and finds joy in putting together Ikea furniture please let me know. We have three bedrooms to construct after 14th August.

The latest news (and no doubt it will change) is that they hope to travel very early in September, have two weeks quarantine, and



then some time to explore the area and settle the boys into their schools. I am not expecting Noel to have any duties before October. He is assured that we will simply wait for him with calmness and peace.

Noel will have pastoral charge of Burton Latimer, Central—Kettering, and Cottingham. He will be their minister, Chair Church Councils, and be the principle minster leading their worship and Holy Communion. He will take full part in Circuit leadership and will be my deputy when I take holiday, etc.

We are now at the 3rd and 4th possible dates for a Welcome Service, being Sunday 20th September or 18th October. This will be at Central, Kettering at 10.30 a.m. and will be led by Rev. Helen Cameron, Chair of the Northampton District. Two new minsters, two years running. Quite a change from farewells, reductions in staffing, and building closures?

There seems little doubt that the Holy Spirit is at work.

Noel and his family will be a great blessing to this Circuit and area.

Reflections on being a circuit steward

I must admit that when Andrew asked me to share a few thoughts on my time as a circuit steward now that I am stepping down after my second six year stint, I didn't immediately know what to say, but after some time to think about it, I offer them to you now.

Firstly it seems I have spent an awfully large part of those 12 years thinking about stationing, mainly because I have been part of the stationing group for quite a few years.

Stationing involves reading through potential presbyters (ministers) profiles and trying to make some sort of short list of people who would possibly feel they have something to bring to our circuit, though the final list is produced by the district chairs. But it's surprising how many times our lists and theirs have the same names on them.

The other part of being on stationing is producing with the other members of the team a profile of our circuit, this has been a very positive process for me, sharing and learning much more about the other churches in our circuit.

It can be quite a wrench when ministers

move on, being part of the circuit leadership teams brings a close relationship with them. But the other side of the coin is the excitement of meeting and working with new ministers. Nothing is better than seeing an idea become reality that you remember reading about on that person's profile.

The other side of the role is working alongside your other circuit stewards and building a real bond with them. I will miss being part of that, the mucking in togeth-



cleaning and decorating a manse or sharing attendance at various district events, and working through all the business of being church and circuit in the 21^{st} century.

I give special mention to Wendy Curtis who has been senior circuit steward during my time, who is also standing down, thank you Wendy for your wise knowledge of doing things in the Methodist way" and your willingness to always go the extra mile, and of course your friendship and support.

How do I see the future of our Methodist circuit at this time? Putting pandemics to one side, I do believe and have hope for the future as we trust in Jesus to quide

for we are the children of God, loved and cared for throughout this pandemic and beyond.


